therapy. ESS is hosting two barefoot hoof-trimming clinics this year. The first will be April 27, with

farrier Ida Hammer. This handson clinic is limited to eight participants and there are just a few openings left. Contact Ruth at ESS if you are interested in this. Then on April 28, Hammer will present a four-hour educational clinic designed to help horse

owners or other professionals to understand the horse's hoof. Topics covered include: understanding the natural hoof and natural locomotion and their effects on your horse; how a healthier hoof can change your horse's performance; why having a natural hoof is more than just pulling the shoes; instruction on using hoof boots and the variety available; subtle changes you can make so you can continue to ride your horse immediately after the removal of horseshoes; conditions such as navicular, founder, white line disease and club foot. The cost of this clinic is \$50 with half of the proceeds going to benefit ESS. There is not a limit on participants for this clinic.
